- Give yourself plenty of turn around time. Once papers are received in the office there can be up to a two week processing time depending on workload. If papers are need by a certain date, please indicate date needed. If papers are needed in 14 days or less from postmark date, there will be a rush fee applied (\$5 per head). The office intends to process work in a quick, efficient matter but during the height of the registration time, a slower turnaround time should be expected.
- Double check your lamb's information flock number (ear tag), sire & dam registration numbers and flock numbers, birth type and birth date.
- Print legibly If you want to type your registration applications, there
 are Excel documents available on the website that you can type in the
 necessary information, save a copy for your records then email, fax or

mail it to the office.

- For percentage sheep, please use an application for percentage registrations or, if you do not have a percentage form, please indicate the animals that are percentage registrations.
- Please include a breeding certificate if needed.
- For transfers, be sure to include a date of sale.
- If you would like to have transfers sent to the new owner, please include that on the submitted documents.
- Please indicate if flock copies are needed (\$1/head).
- All work orders should include \$3 for postage, shipping and handling.
- Don't forget to include a daytime phone number or email that you can be contacted at if there are
 questions at the time of processing.
- If you have not paid your 2014 membership dues, you can submit that with the work you send in.
- Payment is required at the time of submission. Accepted forms of payment include check, credit card or PayPal (there's a direct link to PayPal on the USSA website homepage).
- If you plan to fax applications, please make sure they are legible.

If there's anything that I can do to help registering lambs be a smooth process, please feel free to call or email me!



Sheep Center Nominations Open

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is seeking nominations for individuals to serve on the National Sheep Industry Improvement Center (NSIIC) board of directors. Nominations are due to the American Sheep Industry Association (ASI) by May 1.

The board will have three vacancies. Members whose appointments will expire are Linda Campbell (Va.) and Rochelle Oxarango (Idaho), both representing producers, and Greg Ahart (Calif.), representing expertise in marketing. Neither Campbell nor Oxarango are eligible to be re-nominated because of term limits. Ahart is eligible to be re-nominated to his current position.

ASI is certified to nominate members to the NSIIC board. The ASI executive board will meet via a conference call in May to make nominations. Nomination forms and information can be found at www.ams.usda.gov/AMSv1.0/NSIIC.

The sheep center was established as part of the 2008 Farm Bill and its board administers a grant program designed to improve the competitiveness of the U.S. sheep and goat industries.

Denver, Colo. -- The American Sheep Industry Association's (ASI) Young Entrepreneur Committee is spearheading the search for two candidates to represent the U.S. sheep industry at the 2nd World Ovinpiades competition in France on Sept. 28 - Oct. 4. Twenty countries have been invited to enter two participates in this two-day competition where contenders will challenge each other in multiple proficiency areas related to the sheep industry.

The World Challenge is open to college students between the ages of 19 and 23, inclusive. Some of the competencies that will be included in the challenge are:

- Sheep breed recognition
- Ewe sorting
- Foot trimming
- Body condition of ewes
- Body condition score of lambs

- Ewes manipulation
- Quad efficiencies
- Quad with a trailer competency
- Sheep shearing

In addition to the competition, participants will have the opportunity to meet with other young shepherds from around the world, participate in farm visits, sporting activities and explore the region.

There are two parts to the application process:

- 1. Upload a short video selling yourself as a competitor for the competition as well as demonstrate the skills necessary to compete in the categories listed above.
- 2. Complete the application found on the home page of www.sheepusa.org.

ASI must receive the video and application by May 1. Participants and alternates will be notified by June 1. Two all-expenses-paid trips to the event in France representing the United States will be awarded to the top two finalists; spending money will be the responsibility of the contestant.

NSIP (National Sheep Improvement Program) UPDATE

Exciting things are going on in the sheep industry that will provide great opportunities for Suffolk breeders if we can position ourselves to take advantage of them.

The National Lamb Board which is funded by your check-off dollars from the sale of your lambs at market commissioned a study "The American Lamb Industry Roadmap Project" otherwise known as the "Hale Report". This study was designed to address changes needed in the sheep industry to best position us for growth, if not survival into the future.

Targeted areas included increased efficiency of production, improved carcass cutablity and consistency of the product, as well as increased use of quantitative genetic selection for seedstock with those traits important to commercial sheep production.

This coupled with the recent publication of research done at the U.S. Sheep Experiment Station in Dubois, Idaho that identified Suffolks as the breed most suited as the terminal sire breed contributing the most to the profitability and efficiency of western range flocks. Within the group of Suffolk rams used for the study, offspring of rams from flocks enrolled in NSIP (National Sheep Improvement Program) clearly outperformed Suffolk rams from those flocks that were not. This research identifies suffolks and the use of genetic evaluations as meeting the goals spelled out in the "Hale Report".

NSIP in an attempt to serve the sheep industry by providing those rams needed to accomplish the goals of the Hale Report has offered the following incentives to encourage enrollment and use of NSIP.

Any new flock or inactive flock (previously enrolled did not submit data last year) would have their annual flock fees waived for one year.

Members under 22 years of age get their flock fees waived for 3 years.

In addition new flocks will be assigned a mentor to answer questions and assist the training of producers in how to submit data and interpret the results of their genetic evaluations.

Suffolks are unique in being one of the few sheep breeds that can actually contribute to the viability of the commercial sheep industry on a large scale. Let's not let this opportunity slip through our grasp. Enroll your Suffolk flock in NSIP!

By properly managing forages, feeding costs can be reduced, pastures improved, weeds reduced, break-even price reduced and profits increased.

California Wool Schools Scheduled

A wool classing school will be held at the Hopland Research and Extension Center, Hopland, Calif., on April 27-29.

The focus of the school is to provide the U.S. sheep industry with trained wool classers who can assist in improving the quality of the domestic wool clip, which is imperative to American wool becoming more competitive and available in the international as well as domestic markets.

Some of the topics to be covered include wool fiber growth, objective measurement of wool, genetic selection programs, wool contamination, handling practices and packaging, labeling and marking. To fine tune the skill of wool classing, students will work with a very experienced wool classer who works in most of the western states during shearing season and handles a wide variety of wool.

The cost of the classing school is \$185 per student and includes all educational materials, a wool resource note-book, wool samples and a wool handling and shearing DVD and covers the cost of the facility.



Rosemary Braised Lamb Shanks

Prep Time: 30 minutes Cook Time: 2 Hours

Ingredients:
2 Lamb Shanks

Salt & Pepper to taste

2 teaspoon of Olive Oil

1 medium onion, chopped

1 large carrot, cut in to 1/4 inch rounds

1 can (28 ounces) whole peeled tomatoes with juice

4 cloves garlic, minced

1 cup (750 milliliter) red wine

4 (10.5 ounce) can beef broth

2 tablespoons chopped fresh rosemary


Directions:

Sprinkle shanks with salt and pepper. Heat oil in heavy large pot over medium-high heat. Working in batches, cook shanks until brown on all sides, about 8 minutes. Transfer shanks to plate.

Add onions, carrots and garlic to pot and saute until golden brown, about 10 minutes. Stir in wine, tomatoes and beef broth. Season with rosemary. Return shanks to pot, pressing down to submerge. Bring to boil, then reduce heat to mediumlow. Cover, and simmer until meat is tender, about two hours.

Remove cover from pot. Simmer about 20 minutes longer. Transfer shanks to platter, place in a warm oven. Boil juices in pot until thickened, about 15 minutes. Spoon over shanks!
