Jim attended grade school at Prescott Community School, three years at Corning High School and graduated from Nodaway High School in 1943. He enlisted in the Navy in 1944 and served his country during WWII in the Phillipines and Japan on board an L.S.T in the South Pacific. He

received his honorable discharge May 12, 1946.

A celebration of Don's life will be held at 10:30 A.M., Wednesday, May 14, 2014, from the First Lutheran Church in Maquoketa. Visitation will be held from 2 to 7 P.M. on Tuesday, May 13, 2014 from the Carson Celebration of Life Center in Maquoketa. Burial will be at the Pine Hill Cemetery, rural Grand Mound, Iowa.

Donald Eugene Cain was born on May 7, 1939 in Maquoketa, Iowa, to Roy Eugene and Ruth Dorothy Marie (Geronzin) Cain. He grew up on the family farm in rural Delmar and graduated from Elwood High School in 1957. He then began farming and served in the U.S. Army Reserves for six

years. He met Carol Jane Petersen in 1962 and they were married on February 23, 1963 in Clinton, lowa. Don was a lifelong farmer and farmed the family farm with his wife Carol for over 50 years. Don was devoted to many projects and organizations and was generous with his time, talent and resources. He was a 33 year board member on the Clinton County Fair Board and had received the Clinton County Hall of Fame Award in 2013. He had been an 11 year director of the AIF Southeast District and had received the lowa Fair "Man of the Year" Award in Des Moines. Additionally, he had served as board member for the Clinton County Pork Producers for six years and as a board member of the First Trust and Savings Bank in Wheatland. He was first a member of the Lost Nation Masonic Lodge and later the Zealous Masonic Lodge #435 of Oxford Junction. Don loved his family and farming and had a longtime interest with his family in showing sheep. He also loved his church, St. John's Lutheran Church at Bliedorn, where he was an active member. Through the years he en-

George V. Hunter, age 96, of Stoneboro, Pennsylvania passed away on Tuesday, March 18, 2014 in Orchard Manor Nursing Home, Grove City, PA where he had resided since having a stroke in 2008. He leaves behind a loving family and a legacy that extends to the countless lives that he touched through his active involvement in the livestock industry.

George was born in Grove City, PA on June 6, 1917 to the late Samuel Robb and Mary Denniston Hunter. He married Evelyn McMichael on June 12, 1943. They celebrated their 70th Anniversary in 2013.

During his life, George was a selfemployed farmer and a metalsmith at the Arthur Armour Forge in Grove City. He served his country during World War II as a U.S. Army Medic. He was a member of Tower Presbyterian Church in Grove City and in recent years had been affiliated with the Irwin Presbyterian Church. He taught Sunday school class for decades. He often was the chosen "preacher," sharing the Good Word at many livestock shows for informal Sunday services.

Active in agriculture throughout his life, George attended Penn State University. He was an active member of numerous sheep and wool organizations. He was the secretary for over four decades for the PA Suffolk Sheep Association. His unique Suffolk newsletters were popular, not just in Pennsylvania, but across the entire nation. George was well-known for his signaturestyle of artfully blending current livestock news with a history lesson and a little dose of humor. He also served as secretary for the PA Shorthorn Cattle Association for many years. George was a past president of the Mercer County Board of Extension. He was enthusiastic and passionate in his endeavors to promote the livestock industry. George was well known in Pennsylvania and nationally for exhibiting prize winning sheep and cattle at many county fairs, Keystone Livestock Exposition, PA Farm Show and the Chicago International Livestock Exposition for more than 50 years. He was a frequent judge of sheep and cattle in the Eastern United States. He also managed sheep sales in Pennsylvania. He received numerous awards for his outstanding contributions to the livestock industry.

The George Hunter Family was honored as the 1983 Pennsylvania Farm Family of the Year. In 1994, Hunter was inducted into the Pennsylvania Livestock Hall of Fame at the Keystone Livestock Exposition. Also in 1994, the Keystone Sheep Sale was dedicated to him in honor of his many years of contributions to the sheep industry. Nationally, George was recognized in 1997 at Louisville with the presentation of the Distinguished Service Award from the National Suffolk Sheep Association. His service to the Suffolk industry began in 1939 with the purchase of his first Suffolk. Decades later, he was still promoting Suffolks. His outstanding loyalty, motivation and dedication as a Suffolk breeder continued into the 2000s.

Survivors include his wife, Evelyn, at home, nine children, Samuel and his wife Linda, Hagerstown, MD; Mary Musser and husband Donald, New Middletown, OH; Audrey Wheeler and husband Dennis, Mercer; Donald, Grove City; W. Glenn and wife Linda, Grove City; Liz Kingsley and husband Greg, Volant; Robert and wife Polly, Pickerington, OH; Hazel, Stoneboro; and Frank Hunter, Jamestown, NY; 15 grandchildren and 20 great grandchildren.

Annual NSIP Sheep Sale Scheduled for July

The Annual Center of the Nation Sale, featuring National Sheep Improvement Program sheep, is scheduled for Friday and Saturday, July 25-26, at the Clay County Fairgrounds in Spencer, Iowa. The two-day event will include educational seminars and one of the Midwest's largest gatherings of sheep producers along with the sale, conducted by Conover Auction Service at 1 p.m. on Saturday.

"We're looking to have a good sale this year," says sale organizer Larry Bremer. "Feed prices are down and lamb prices are up. And, as always, we have a great line-up of NSIP sheep going on the block."

Hailed as the best place for commercial one-stop shopping, the Center of the Nation Sale, now in its tenth year, features sheep of any breed in the NSIP program. "Offerings range from elite rams to above-average maternal and terminal sires and ewes," says Bremer. "There is no show, only the sale, and sheep are presented by their NSIP performance data."

Bill and Susan Shultz of Bunker Hill Farm, DeGraff, Ohio, are yearly participants: "There is a need to merchandise seedstock in a non-traditional venue. Midwest producers created this sale as a marketplace for sheep with Estimated Breeding Values (EBVs), and the total sheep industry has benefitted."

NSIP calculates Estimated Breeding Values on a variety of traits based on generations of performance data. Using breeding indexes for flock improvement is the subject of an educational session scheduled for Friday afternoon. More sessions are booked for Saturday morning starting at 10 a.m. Dr. Leo Timms, Iowa State University professor of animal science, will address minimizing the impact of mastitis; and Dr. Reid Redden, North Dakota State University sheep specialist and NSIP Chairman, will report on the American Lamb Industry Roadmap Production Committee.

For producers like the Shultz's, the educational component is an important part of the event: "We began making the yearly trip to Spencer with the purpose of selling our genetics to progressive lamb producers and exchanging our genetics with fellow seedstock providers. But we soon realized it was the opportunity to exchange ideas among these sheep producers that has added real value for us."

Bremer says the sale will have "something for everyone who is looking for quality breeding stock, the opportunity to learn more about the NSIP and the sheep industry, and a chance to interact with producers from all over the country."



NSIP (National Sheep Improvement Program) UPDATE

I thought it might be interesting to many of you to know the type and extent of data which is processed though NSIP. Most breeders categorize Suffolk's as terminal sires and as such the traits dealing with growth and carcass quality appear to have the most economic importance to commercial producers.

The growth traits that NSIP reports are "WWT" weaning weight taken on lambs around 60 days of age and "PWWT" post weaning weight taken when lambs are about 120 days of age. The carcass trait reports are "EMD" eye muscle depth and fat which are both obtained though on farm ultrasounds at the same time that the 120 day weights are recorded. EMD is the measurement used by most of the major sheep producing countries of the world instead of loin eye area which has been the traditional standard in the US. The two measurements are highly correlated and both are an excellent predictor of overall muscling in a lamb. Currently over half of NSIP Suffolk participants record carcass data but it is not required to be enrolled.

NSIP has developed a formula which includes all of the carcass and growth traits blended into an economically balanced index called *CARCASS PLUS*. Improvement in this index is the challenge of most NSIP Suffolk breeders.

NSIP also measures and provides EBV's (estimated breeding values) on other economically important traits such as birth weights, milk production, number of lambs born, and number of lambs weaned. The emphasis placed on selecting for these traits vary between producers and their overall flock improvement goals.



Grilled Lamb Fajitas

Prep time: 20 min. Cook time: 12 - 15 min. **Ingredients:**

2 - 5oz American Lamb leg steaks

2 green onions

1 fresh poblano or ancho chilies (optional)

1/3 red bell pepper, halved

1/3 green bell pepper, halved

1/3 yellow bell pepper, halved

4 medium flour tortillas, warmed

Fresh Salsa

Fajita Marinade:

1/4 cup chopped fresh cilantro or parsley

3 tablespoons orange juice

2 tablespoons lime juice

1 tablespoon olive oil

1 teaspoon ground cumin

1 teaspoon chili powder

1 teaspoon dried oregano leaves, crushed

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper

1/4 teaspoon red pepper flakes, crushed

Directions

In a small bowl, prepare fajita marinade: combine all ingredients. Place lamb in glass dish. Pour marinade over lamb, cover and refrigerate 4 to 6 hours.

Grill over medium-hot coals. Cook lamb, onions, chilies, and bell peppers 4 inches from coals. Cook steaks 5 - 6 minutes per side or to desired degree of doneness: 145°F for medium-rare, 160°F for medium or 170°F for well. Turn vegetables frequently until cooked.

Slice lamb steaks and vegetables into 1/4- inch thick slices. Serve on tortillas, top with salsa and roll up.


