DISTRICT 1

There are two candidates to fill one director position in district 1.

RON ALVES, OAKDALE, CA

My name is Ron Alves. My wife and I live on a small farm in Oakdale, a community in the northern San Joaquin Valley of California. Our sheep adventure started in 1974 and currently we own about 125 black face ewes, of which about 100 are Registered Suffolks. We show very little and most of our animals are sold as project lambs, some seed stock, range rams, and terminal lambs for consumption.

The cliché "If it ain't broke don't fix it" <u>does not</u> apply to the Suffolk breed, in my opinion. The dramatic decline in Suffolk registrations and Association membership during the past decades is evidence enough that Suffolk breeders need to address why and how to reverse these trends. I would welcome the opportunity to become part of the leadership of a group that revitalizes interest in the Suffolk breed.

Pathways that I would like to explore and perhaps implement include:

- 1) Emphasis on slick shearing at shows.
- 2) Redefining breed standards and perhaps defining types within the breed.
- 3) Development of user-friendly production criteria that may parallel other species models.
- 4) Continuing to invigorate the motivation for youth to select Suffolks as their sheep breed of choice.
- 5) Incentivize sheep producers to register Suffolks and join the Suffolk Association.
- 6) Investigate the possibility of turning the membership directory into annual yearbook similar to what the Suffolk Sheep Society (British Isles) publishes yearly.

There are other issues that also need to be addressed, but the above gives the reader an indication of what I am about. I do not advocate change for changes sake. Nor am I a proponent of a board operating in a vacuum. Development of a plan to renew interest in the Suffolk breed must be a joint venture by the membership at large directing action by the elected Suffolk Board. I would take great pleasure in being a part of a revised blue-print for Registered Suffolk Sheep!

GAYLE LUCAS, PHILLIPSBURG, MT

Hello! My name is Gayle Lucas. I am a Suffolk breeder in Montana and I own and operate the Prairie Rose Suffolk flock. I raise stud bucks, ram sires, terminal sires, direct marketing sires, seed stock and some show animals as part of my living.

My experiences with sheep began over 34 years ago as a range conservationist for the U.S. Forest Service in Idaho and Eastern Oregon where I administered several thousand acres of grazing allotments on public land and worked directly with sheep ranchers and herders. I also spent a tour of duty at the ARS/ U.S. Sheep Experiment Station, in Dubois, Idaho, where I was directly involved in research and production aspects of the station, which at that time had between 10,000-12,000 head of sheep on hand. From there, I began building a flock of cross-bred, commercially oriented production ewes where we used Suffolk rams as terminal sires. The lambs from this operation went into a direct 'farm to table' gourmet meat enterprise. I began incorporating purebred Suffolk ewes into the operation and soon replaced the cross-bred flock with the superior Suffolk ewes. The Prairie Rose flock evolved from those original, papered Suffolk sheep into what it is currently today.

I've had the pleasure of being a youth sheep leader & county coordinator in Montana 4-H for 20+ years. Additionally, I've served as a director and/or officer on one of the state sheep associations in Montana for 19 years

and am currently involved with others in developing a new all breeds sale in Montana. These experiences have enabled me to deal with, and understand many facets of the industry and I believe it gives me a solid foundation to serve as a director for the U.S.S.A. board.

As an association, we need to engage youth *and* their parents into raising Suffolk sheep through involvement with youth agricultural programs such as 4-H & FFA. And then, encouraging them to stay the course through mentoring programs and other youth activities.

We also need to encourage new adult breeders and producers and provide ample opportunity for them to raise the type of Suffolk they desire. Just as importantly, as an association we need to listen to *all* existing members and producers and their ideas, encourage them to grow their program, rather than alienate them because they breed a certain 'type' of Suffolk. Current members are just as important to our association as the prospect of new members.

The Suffolk breed is an amazing, diverse, versatile, economically important breed & is embraced by both pure-bred breeders, show breeders, niche breeders and commercial sheep producers alike. Not many breeds can boast that they can hang a premium carcass, work as a superior terminal sire, produce fast growing lambs with vitality, and yes, even reign in the show ring whether slicked or fitted. The **strength** of the breed is born of this diversity & versatility. We need to embrace this diversity and versatility that is within the Suffolk breed rather than tear it down at every opportunity. What works for one operation, won't necessarily work for another operation. There is no singular 'magic bullet' nor is there any one "type" of Suffolk that will work across the board. We can build the Suffolk breed stronger by accessing & building upon the variety of Suffolk genetics available to shape the future.

I will work earnestly and openly for the membership and in the promotion of the Suffolk breed. I would be honored to serve as your District 1 director. I ask that you would consider me when you cast your vote. Thank you!

DISTRICT 2

There are three candidates running to fill one director position in district 2.

MATT BEALS, ALEXANDRIA, NE

To the dedicated Suffolk breeders of District 2; please let me introduce myself. My wife Amy and I operate Dry Sandy Sheep Company and currently we are running 90 Suffolk ewes. We entered the Suffolk business in the spring 2012, after dispersing our herd of Red Angus cows the previous fall. Let me lay out my qualifications to serve District 2 and the entire Suffolk breed.

My folks tell me that my first word was "cow". So from that point, until I dispersed the Red Angus in 2012, I spent 39 years in the cattle business. I have experience in the commercial cow-calf sector; I have seen the feedlot industry first-hand. We had a club calf sale for 15 years while growing up. JOE EMENHEISER, SAINT ALBANS, VT

I started my current Suffolk flock in 2002. Since then, I managed two sheep operations in New York (250 and 2,200 ewes), where I developed my Suffolks as commercial sires. Additionally, I competed on successful livestock and meats judging teams at Oklahoma State and worked as a butcher in Pennsylvania. All of these experiences ingrained in me the importance of commer-

cially-relevant purebred livestock. As a graduate student at Virginia Tech, I developed the first ultrasound carcass EPDs for NSIP. After a beef project for my PhD, I joined the University of Vermont faculty in 2014 as the state Extension Livestock Specialist. I am in the process of purchasing a farm and expanding my flock of 25 ewes to keep pace with my terminal sire markets. Most of my rams are sold to commercial producers who have no need for registration papers. My intent as a Director is to help create a breed association that offers something of real value to these commercial customers. This means a USSA that 1) values meat production above all else, 2) focuses on promoting the Suffolk's superiority as a meat breed, and 3) embraces objective evaluation methods that ensure that Suffolks actually stand up to the claims. Trends in Katahdin registrations reveal the importance of being in tune with commercial industry needs and using 21st century tools. Juniors are no doubt the future, but let's not focus so exclusively on young Suffolk showmen that we continue to overlook the surge of new commercial sheep producers, particularly here in District 4. In my day job, I receive many calls from new farmers who are selling Icelandic lamb at farmers' markets, and who have no idea that Suffolks are capable of being more than show sheep. This is a reflection of the image that USSA projects, and it hasn't done well for registrations. Let's play the game that Suffolks can win: lean growth and feed efficiency. Politics does not rank high among my interests, but I am happy to offer leadership and expertise as a Director, if the membership agrees with my view that it is time to renew focus on once again becoming the premier terminal sire breed in the world.

I have raised Suffolk sheep for over 50 years, starting with a 4-H project in southeastern Nebraska. Production data combined with the beautiful breed characteristics of the Suffolk will go a long way in convincing commercial breeders of the economic value of the breed.

I also think that support of junior breeders is vital to the future of the industry. We can do this by continuing to support the ewe lambs futurity and the USSA junior shows at the both the regional and national levels. I am looking forward to the day when my 2 grandsons will be old enough to be a part of the UJSSA.

As a director, I will push for the board to be open and transparent as it promotes the beauty and productivity of the breed. I don't believe we should let the show ring dictate what we are doing as a breed and instead get back to endorsing the 3-dimensional sheep that the commercial industry demands. We don't need different breed standards for different types of sheep; instead we need to make sure judges of Suffolks are versed in our current breed standards.

North American International Livestock Exposition Sheep Show Schedule Expanded to Nov. 12-20; New Junior Supreme Champion Ram Class Added.

July 7, 2015 Louisville, KY. North American International Livestock Exposition (NAILE) officials have announced that the Sheep Division shows and sales schedule is expanded by one day to better accommodate the show's huge junior events. There were more than 1,600 junior wethers and more than 1,700 junior breeding sheep entered in 2014. Both numbers represent new show records.

This year, the Junior Wether Lamb Show, sponsored **by Farm Credit Mid-America**, starts at 8 am on Friday, Nov. 13 and resumes at 8 am on Saturday, Nov. 14. The Junior Breeding Sheep Show begins on Saturday, Nov. 14 in the afternoon and continues on Sunday. These earlier start dates mean that all sheep arrival will begin at 8 am on Wednesday, Nov. 11 instead of noon as in prior years. The new arrival deadline for Junior Wether Lambs is Noon on Thursday, Nov. 12. The arrival deadline for Junior Breeding Show sheep remains at noon on Friday, Nov. 13.

The Junior Show Showmanship contests move to Thursday, Nov. 12 at 5 pm.

The popular Lead Line classes start at 4 pm on Friday, Nov. 13. This show also offers special classes for young people. The Photography competition is expanded to two divisions- Black & White and Color. The Fine Arts class will return, however the Knitting contest is discontinued.

Another major addition to the junior contests is the premier of a **Junior Supreme Champion Ram** award. The Robert Hall Junior Supreme Champion Ewe class continues, and a \$1,000 premium is offered for each class and they are part of the Junior Breeding Sheep Show.

Open Shows

In 2015 there are 21 breeds offering open shows. Thirteen of those are National Shows. The show ends on Friday, Nov. 20 with the naming of the Open Supreme Champion. Shows will again be video streamed live on the NAILE website. Video archives of the 2014 are still available on the NAILE's You Tube channel.

Wool Show

The NAILE Wool Show returns with \$2,500 in premiums. Some classes have been revised. Entries must arrive by Monday, Nov. 16 at 6:00 pm. Fleeces are displayed throughout the show week in the South Wing Lobby.

Catalogs containing show information and rules are available for download on the NAILE website at www.livestockexpo.org. Printed catalogs and entry forms are automatically mailed to those who have participated in the NAILE the past two years. Catalogs are free, and anyone wishing to receive one should contact the NAILE offices at P.O. Box 36367, Louisville, KY 40233-6367, by fax at 502-367-5299, or by e-mail at KFEC-NAILE@ksfb.ky.gov.

Entry deadline for Sheep Division shows is October 1. Exhibitors may submit entries by mail at any time and on the website beginning September 1.

The 42nd Annual NAILE is produced by the Commonwealth of Kentucky at the Kentucky Exposition Center in Louisville, Kentucky under the direction of the Kentucky State Fair Board. During the Expo's run November 3 through 20, the facility's entire 1,200,000 square feet of climate-controlled exhibit space is used. More than 220,000 visitors and exhibitors attend the event annually.



The National Sheep Improvement Program (NSIP) is committed to helping American sheep producers improve profitability through the use of genetic information. NSIP and its membership recognize the importance of combining genetic evaluations derived from performance records with visual assessments when selecting breeding stock for purebred and commercial flocks. Founded in 1986, this non-profit organization is administered by a volunteer board of directors. All breeds are represented.

WHAT WE DO

NSIP is the only American organization to offer U.S. sheep producers a proven genetic selection system by which to improve flock productivity and quality. Using a process similar to that used by nearly all other livestock species to aid in genetic selection, NSIP develops Estimated Breeding Values (EBVs) which sheep producers can use to select animals for important traits, including productivity, quality and flock health.

In alignment with the U.S. Sheep Industry Roadmap, NSIP is dedicated to helping sheep producers improve traits that result in animals with desirable, profitable characteristics. Ultimately, we offer an excellent tool and method to move the industry toward its goal of value-based carcass pricing, using genetic selection criteria for carcass quality.

ESTIMATED BREEDING VALUES LEAD THE WAY TO GENETIC IMPROVEMENT

By using breeding stock with genetic predictability, all types of flocks have a foundation of genetic information upon which to build a superior and more consistent product for their customers, whether this be a feeder, packer or consumer. This genetic predictability is achievable through NSIP's Estimated Breeding Values.

Stage is Set to Improve U.S. Sheep Genetics

The Lamb Industry Roadmap has strongly supported the improvement of sheep genetics from the start, and it is extremely pleased by many positive developments on this front.

This spring has been a busy time for the National Sheep Improvement Program (NSIP). NSIP has more flocks enrolled and more sheep with EBVs than ever before – thanks to support from the American Lamb Board and the National Sheep Industry Improvement Center,. The support from the industry has made this expansion possible, and the returns will be seen industry wide with the increased use of quantitative genetic selection – thereby improving the productivity and profitability of American sheep producers.

To better serve the current NSIP members and the entire U.S. sheep industry, NSIP has hired a part-time program director, Rusty Burgett. Rusty has experience in the commercial and purebred sectors of the industry and is dedicated to improving the nation's sheep flock. The board also welcomes Tom Boyer as vice chairman and Walt Williams as treasurer as well as several new breed representatives. The advancement of NSIP is a result of the hard work of this volunteer board.

Continuing this momentum, NSIP was awarded funding from the ASI Let's Grow committee for the American Sheep Industry Genetic Improvement Initiative. NSIP's educational effort encompasses all aspects of the sheep industry across the country and focuses on productivity improvement. The project includes:

Educational materials

- Ram Buyers Guide to Productivity Improvement educates commercial producers about selecting rams based on estimated breeding values to increase productivity
- Productivity Improvement Case Study Videos-- Commercial and seedstock producers that have embraced the technology of EBVs will be highlighted as examples for the entire industry

Workshops and Field Days

- Hands-on productivity improvement workshops will be held across the U.S. to demonstrate the benefits of EBVs.
- Breeders Regional Forums-Workshops designed to train breeders on how to use NSIP to make genetic improvement and how to market genetics into the commercial sector
- Development of Seedstock Consortiums- Facilitating working groups of like minded breeders to expedite genetic improvement focusing on range and fine wool producers.

This project is extensive in size and scope and is focused on educating the industry of the benefits that can be reaped when quantitative genetic selection is implemented. To date, NSIP is featured in workshops at 9 different sheep festivals and sales across the U.S.

With a newly adopted mission statement in mind to support, promote and ensure the U.S. sheep industry's future through the development of innovative and sustainable initiatives that increase the productivity, profitability, and growth of the American sheep industry which will further enhance domestic wool and lamb production, the committee planned their program of work.

Starting March 1st applications were made available for Let's Grow Project Grants. These grants were made available to fund groups of producers attempting to increase the production efficiency of the sheep industry. By the May 1st deadline 43 applications had been received seeking nearly 1.4 million dollars in grant funding. The committee met on May 11th in Denver, Colorado to review the proposals. Eleven grants were funded with a total of \$273,306.25 awarded. In addition another \$24,000 was awarded to state associations to fund local state mentor programs.

A new round of funding will be established beginning in the fall. Applications will be available September 1 with proposals due back to the committee by November 15. An announcement of those grants funded is expected by the end of December.

Ingredients

Lamb

1 boneless leg of lamb (5 to 6 pounds)

1/4 cup kosher salt

2 tablespoons sumac

2 tablespoons ground fennel seed

1 tablespoon ground pasilla chile, or other medium-

hot chile, such as ancho or mulato

1 tablespoon freshly ground black pepper

2 teaspoons ground cinnamon

1 teaspoon ground clove

3 tablespoons coarsely chopped fresh oregano

1 tablespoon coarsely chopped fresh rosemary

1/3 cup extra virgin olive oil

Onion Gravy

1 cup drippings from roasting pan

1 cup thinly sliced onions

1 cup Rioja or other red wine

1 cup chicken stock

2 tablespoons unsalted butter

1 tablespoon all purpose flour

Potato Soufflé

3 pounds medium size Yukon gold potatoes, washed, peeled and quartered

4 ounces (1 stick) unsalted butter, at room temperature, cut in 8 to 10 pieces

1/2 cup all purpose flour

8 large eggs

3 tablespoons kosher salt

1 teaspoon freshly ground nutmeg

Directions

Lamb

Pat the lamb leg dry with paper towels and set aside. Combine the salt, sumac, fennel seed, ground chile, black pepper, cinnamon, clove, oregano and rosemary in a small bowl and stir to combine. Add the olive oil and stir to make a thick paste. Rub the paste over the entire lamb leg, making certain to coat all of the surfaces.

Place the rub-coated lamb leg on the rack of a roasting pan with foil on the bottom. Refrigerate the leg for 2 to 3 hours, or allow to sit at least 30 minutes at room temperature. Thirty minutes before you're ready to roast the lamb leg, heat the oven to 450°F. Put the roasting pan with the lamb leg on a rack in the middle of the oven and roast for 15 minutes. Reduce the temperature to 325°F and continue to roast until a meat thermometer inserted in the center of the

roast registers 140°F for medium rare. Plan on 25 to 30 minutes per pound, or a total of approximately 2-1/2 hours for a 5 to 6 pound leg. Begin checking the temperature after 1-1/2 hours, to get a sense of how quickly the meat is cooking.

When it reaches 140°F, remove the lamb leg from the oven and pour 1/2 cup water in the bottom of the pan. Cover the lamb leg loosely with foil and let stand 15 to 20 minutes before slicing.

Onion Gravy

Add the pan drippings to a medium size saucepan and warm over medium high heat. When the dripping and fat are hot, add the onions and t sauté the onions until soft and caramelized, about 10 minutes.

Add the butter and flour, reduce the heat to medium and cook stirring constantly for 3 minutes. Add the wine and bring the mixture to a simmer. Reduce the total volume of liquid by half, then add the chicken stock. Bring the mixture to a gentle simmer and cook until it has reduced slightly and thickened to the consistency of gravy.

Potato Soufflé

Heat the oven to 400°F Generously butter a round soufflé dish or casserole that is approximately 4-inches deep and 10 inches in diameter. Set aside.

Place the potatoes in a large pot filled with cold water. Season generously with salt. Bring the water to a boil, reduce to a simmer and cook the potatoes until fork tender, about 15 minutes depending on size.

Pour the potatoes into a colander and shake to remove as much moisture as possible. Place the potatoes in a food mill or a potato ricer and add them back to the pot with the butter and flour. Cook the mixture over low heat, stirring constantly with a wooden spoon. The mixture should come together into a single, cohesive mass.

Transfer the potato mixture to the bowl of an electric stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment. Mix on low speed for about 30 seconds while you crack the eggs into a liquid measure. Lightly whisk the eggs and slowly add to the potatoes with the mixture running. Increase the speed to medium when all of the eggs. Mix 1 minute or until the eggs are fully incorporated and the mixture is smooth.

Scrape the contents of the miser bowl into the prepared baking dish and place on rack in the middle of the oven. Bake until the soufflé has nearly doubled in size and is golden brown, 30 to 40 minutes. Serve immediately.
