NSIP UPDATE

Suffolk Rams Featured in Field Research Project

An exciting project taking place at Mickel Brothers Sheep Company in Spring City, Utah is a terminal sire field trial, where Suffolk rams will be bred to a large group of commercial ewes. The trial will examine the use of Estimated Breeding Values (EBVs) as a reliable measure of growth and muscle with the corresponding economics in a typical range management system.

Mickel Brothers Sheep Company is a part of the Leading Edge Sheep Production Group that represents approximately 30,000 to 32,000 ewes, owned and managed by producers in Utah and Wyoming. The producers in the group want to advance their genetics and production methods to help create, and subsequently meet, the demand of an increased market share.

The trial will include 28 Suffolk ram lambs with EBVs from flocks enrolled in the National Sheep Improvement Program plus a dozen Suffolk ram lambs with no EBV's from the industry. All rams in the study had weights and scrotal measurements taken on October 14 and were condition scored.

The twenty-eight rams with NSIP generated EBVs (14 selected for high growth and 14 selected for high ribeye muscle) and a dozen industry rams will be mated with about 1,100 ewes in early November. Ewes will be shed lambed starting in early April 2018 with tagging, birth data, and tissue samples for parentage testing collected. In late September, lambs will come off the mountain and be shipped directly to a feedlot where lambs will be individually weighed upon arrival. In late 2018, or early 2019, lambs will be reweighed and harvested by Superior Farms. Carcass weights, electronic scanning, and objective carcass measurements will be collected under the guidance of Superior Farms.

The trial is a groundbreaking field trial with leadership being provided by Tom Boyer, Dr. Ron Lewis of University of Nebraska, and the Leading Edge team with partial funding from ASI Let's Grow. The trial represents one of the few times in US sheep industry history where all segments of the industry (seed stock producer,

commercial producer, feeder and packer) have come together and made substantial contributions to a project in an attempt to increase efficiencies and profitability in the sheep industry.



In addition to preparing for the trial, sheep breed representatives and local producers meet at Tom Boyers ranch. The group evaluated rams phenotypically and then with the NSIP data.

Focus on Artificial Insemination in sheep at Dairy Sheep Symposium

Any sheep producer who is thinking about using Artificial Insemination (AI) to improve their flock genetics, should seriously consider attending the 2017 Symposium of the Dairy Sheep Association of North America, November 30 – December 2 in Orford, Quebec. The first day of this year's Symposium will be devoted entirely to AI. Speakers from Canada, Europe, and the US will present on AI techniques used in France, Iceland, and Canada, both cervical and laparoscopic, with both frozen and fresh semen. Presenters will also discuss protocols that will improve conception rates and litter size in AI'd ewes. Furthermore, a large number of dairy sheep producers will be in attendance who have begun using AI to incorporate European genetics into their flocks. Developments in AI techniques, as well as improved availability of internationally-sourced semen, are offering American sheep producers some real opportunities to broaden and improve their breed's gene pool.

The Symposium will be held at the beautiful Estrimont Suites & Spa in Orford, in southern Quebec just north of Vermont. Attendees can register for just one day (i.e., for the day of AI presentations on November 30th), or for the full symposium which includes two days of presentations, a wine-and-cheese reception featuring Canadian sheep-milk cheeses, tours of two Quebecois sheep dairies, and an optional cheese-making workshop. One Pot Baked Lamb Shoulder Slices and Potatoes

Ingredients

2 tablespoons of olive oil

3 pounds of Lamb shoulder, sliced into thin slices (about a quarter inch thick)

1 1/2 teaspoon of kosher salt

2 teaspoons of black pepper

1 teaspoon of ground nutmeg

1 1/2 teaspoons of all spice

1 teaspoon of turmeric

2 teaspoons of dried oregano

1 teaspoon of cinnamon

2 onions, finely diced

5 cloves of garlic, minced

2 cups of diced tomatoes (canned, with the juices)

1/2 cup of stock (beef, chicken or veggie) 3 Russet potatoes, peeled and sliced into

rounds

3 sprigs of fresh Rosemary

1 teaspoon of salt

1 onion sliced

1 bell pepper sliced

Directions

Preheat the oven to 375 degrees.

In a sheet pan, season the lamb slices with spice and toss it well.

Over medium high heat, preheat a sauce pan with the olive oil. Add the seasoned lamb, onions and garlic. Sauté for 3 minutes and cook for another 40 minutes until the lamb juices have evaporated.

Add in the tomatoes, potatoes, salt and toss them well with the lamb slices. Add the fresh rosemary sprigs, cover the pan and roast int he oven for about 1 hour until the potatoes and lamb are tender. If there's still some liquid in the pan, you can remove the cover and let it roast for 15 extra mins until it dries out a little. There will be some sauce at the bottom of the pan which is perfect for mopping with bread or serving over rice! Or just serve with a salad for a lower carb meal. Enjoy

June USSA Board of Directors Meeting Minutes

Best Western, Sedalia, Missouri—Thursday, June 22, 2017

Board Member Present: President, Paul Skartvedt, Vice-President, Rob Zelinsky, Treasurer, Bill Royer, Secretary, Amanda Everts and the following directors: Ron Alves, Gayle Lucas (phone), Kip Kuntz, Matt Beals, Bill Gergen, Randy Hodges, Bret Henderson (phone) and Joe Emenheiser (phone). Absent: Dale Dobberpuhl

<u>Secretary's Report</u>—Secretary Everts reported that the checking account balance is approximately \$13,000. A part-time employee was hired in June and has been processing registry work. Turnaround time for registry work is approximately 2 weeks. Year-to-date, registrations and transfers are down compared to last year.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>—Treasurer Royer reported that fiscal year to-date income is down however there is no concern for insufficient funds to pay bills.

Committee Reports

By-Laws - Chairman, Ron Alves provided copies of the proposed by-law changes to board members present at the meeting. He asked the directors specifically look at Article VIII. The board will re-visit the Standard of Type in a future board meeting. Ron will share the document with directors who were not able to attend the board meeting and the proposed by-laws will be approved for a member vote via email. These by-law changes will be included with the upcoming director election mailing.

Youth Promotion – No report.

Marketing/Promotion – No report.

Budget – Bill Royer provided board members with proposed budget for 2017/2018. The proposed budget is short approximately \$7000 income to be balanced. There was a lengthy discussion regarding ways to balance the budget.

There was a motion to increase rush fees-\$25/head for papers needed in less than 3 days and \$10/head for a general rush (less than 2 weeks). In favor of the motion- Alves, Royer, Hodges, Kuntz, Gergen, Zelinsky, Lucas, Beals, Emenheiser and Henderson. There was no one opposed to the motion. Motion passed.

There was a motion to increase new membership and membership dues paid prior to March 1 to \$40 and dues paid after March 1 to \$60 and increase late registrations to \$15/head. In favor of the motion – Alves, Royer, Hodges, Kuntz, Gergen, Zelinsky, Lucas and Henderson. Oppose to the motion – Beals and Emenheiser. The motion passed. (Note- the late registration price will be effective March 1 as USSA Amnesty Program was approved later in the meeting.)

Kip Kuntz made a motion that the USSA Amnesty Program is effective August 1, 2017 to March 1, 2018. Late registrations will be \$8 per head. The motion was seconded by Randy Hodges. In favor of the motion – Alves, Royer, Hodges, Kuntz, Zelinsky, Gergen, Lucas, Beals, Emenheiser and Henderson. There was no one opposed to the motion. The motion passed.

Scholarship – No report.

Hospitality – Randy Hodges reported that donuts and juice will be available on Friday before the sale.

Ambassador – No report.

Hall of Fame – Chairman, Rob Zelinsky reported that the committee met and provided a list of names to the USSA Board for approval. There was a motion made to approve the names; the motion did not pass. The committee will meet in July to discuss. Ron Alves made a motion that the Hall of Fame each year will consist one individual per district, one at large, maximum of 5 individuals. Kip Kuntz seconded the motion. In favor of the motion – Alves, Royer, Hodges, Kuntz, Lucas, Emenheiser, and Henderson. Opposed to the motion - Zelinsky, Gergen & Beals. The motion passed.

Breed Improvement – It was reported that there are 9 new Suffolk members in NSIP and through the grant fund there has been data entered for 100 Suffolks.

Old Business

Logo -There was a brief discussion on if the USSA board would like to change the current logo. Rob Zelinsky

The association will move forward with option 1. It will be sent to Logobee; other versions of the logo will be created for review.
