What advice would you give someone looking to purchase a Suffolk ram or ewe?

"I really think the most important thing is to have goals in mind with what your offspring will be marketed to. A Suffolk can be big tall and lean, short and square or somewhere in between. Be sure you understand what your buyers will want before you invest in a ram or ewe to breed."

"When picking a ram or ewe, identify what traits you want in your next breeding piece, and why you want to select for those traits. Next, go to as many farms and meet as many breeders as possible. Listen to what their production goals are and evaluate if any of their sheep objectively meet your desires."

"When considering a Suffolk ewe or ram purchase it is helpful to keep in mind the goals for your investment. There are different traits that are needed to fit each operations needs.

With that in mind search out a breeder that can provide stock along with guidance and support to help further the chance of success. Focus on healthy animals that will thrive in your flock."

"Know your ewe flock well; it's strengths and weaknesses. Have a predictable goal in mind and know where to find the genetics that you need to improve your ewe's progeny. Do your homework. Study potential purchases carefully. The best ram for you may not be the best one for other flocks. Buy the best quality that you can afford and be sure that he passes a breeding soundness exam and represents the breed well. Make progress where you need it without losing ground in other traits. Make incremental progress and avoid extremes. Avoid the trap of single trait selection."

Bill Zwvers. Indiana

"Ask questions about longevity, fertility, libido, and udder construction.

Suffolks should live. Ewes should routinely go into 6+ years of age before we start to think about them "aging out". And rams should last that long as well. While ewes may need to be fanned and fed grapes to get them to cycle during the heat of the summer, the ram needs to be ready to work at any point it time and be able to handle some stress and still remain fertile. Not all do.

Udder quality is something that is so underrated to discuss! If you're keeping daughters, you have to think about milk production and udder construction. Teat placement and teat size are such important traits for lamb survival. I'm not in the barn 24 hours a day, nor do I want to be. Lambs need to have every opportunity to find the udder and easily latch on."

"In my opinion purchasing a ram needs to be well researched in order to gather as much information as possible. What positive or negative traits he may pass on to his offspring if retaining female offspring need to be of upmost importance. I generation of offspring can play a major role on the projection of your flock for multiple generations in the future. In my opinion less than 10% of rams from a particular contemporary group are true "Stud Rams". Linebred rams tend to breed more true than the outliers within a group. You will truly never realize the true value of a "Stud Ram" until you lamb his daughters & granddaughters. Often times mature rams if offered for sale can be the best investment

When purchasing females I recommend purchasing a group of like bred ewes from a breeder whom you think will help you with any problems may arise in the future. If only in the market for one I would recommend selecting a female with a proven lineage & one that aligns with your current production goals. From my previous experiences in the last 32 years regardless of where you purchase females only maybe 60% will meet your expectations within 5 years.

I would also recommend on selecting ewes from a breeder who has at least somewhat of a similar feeding & management program as yourself as this will help limit some of the factors that you may encounter. The fewer flocks you use to gather genetics from will most definitely help with biosecurity issues such as footrot, soremouth, parasites, abortion agents & what not."

"When buying rams, I prefer to go visit the flock in person, so I can see all the rams, along with the sires, dams and siblings. I generally ask lots of questions about lamb vigor, dam's mothering ability, and other things that you won't know from visual evaluation alone. I want to put my hands on the ram, check the mouth and testicles, evaluate the muscle and top line. I ask to see production data (weights, EBVs) and see how it compares to the contemporary group. And most importantly, I want to study them on the move to really evaluate structural soundness.

The best advice I ever received was to not be afraid to invest in good rams. This is not the place to try to get by on the cheap."

"That is a hard one depends on what kind of Suffolk you want to raise? For myself I look for level hip good on the feet and legs depth of body good bone and breed characteristics."

THE EVENT SALE JUNE 9 - 10 Illinois State Fairgrounds Springfield, Illinois

The American Cheviot Sheep Society will manage THE EVENT. A brand-new Suffolk event with a sale is being held in conjunction with the Cheviot, Oxford, Tunis & Montadale sales currently held in Springfield, Illinois. All sale entries are due by April 25th. Mail your entries to Jeff Ebert PO Box 231, Wamego, KS 66547.

LOCATION: Illinois State Fairgrounds, North Sheep Barn Springfield, Illinois. All sale sheep will be housed in this facility.

PEOPLE'S CHIOCE SHOW:

Friday, June 9th at 6:00 PM. Sale Order will be determined by the paid attendees of THE EVENT. Every attendee, including consignors will get one vote. Sheep will be lined up in the ring by age, oldest to youngest. The top 10 rams and top 10 ewes will be determined by the vote and sold in that order. All the rest of the rams and ewes will be sold by birthdate. Oldest to youngest. Sheep can be presented slick or in fleece. Only requirements, as this is a show where the Suffolk breed is on display, the sheep need to be washed within a week of the show and either sheared or cut out in 2023.

SALE: Saturday, June 10th, Following the Cheviot, Tunis, Oxford and Montadale sales at approximately 12:00 PM, with Billy MacCauley as Auctioneer. The Suffolk Sale will not begin before 12:00 PM.

- ENTRY DEADLINE APRIL 25th: Please, be on time! We want to have the catalog out in good time to prospective buyers and we simply cannot wait for late entries. Email entries will be accepted. Emailed and faxed entries will not be cataloged until entry fees are received.
- ENTRY FEES & COMMISSION— Entry fees are \$30/head payable at time of entry. In addition to the entry fee, 11% of the final bid will be charged as a sales commission. 10% to ACSS as sale manager and 1% to the USSA. Entry fees are non-refundable on any sheep that are sifted or otherwise fail to make the sale. Please use the enclosed entry form. If you need additional room, simply photocopy the form, or provide the information on a blank sheet of paper. Information Sale Day will be accepted, but you should make every attempt to provide pedigree information to the prospective buyers. Remember the April 25th deadline, and please be on time!!!
- LATE ENTRIES: For all entries received after the deadline date and before the catalog is printed, we will make every effort to include these in the catalog. All entries that are received after the catalog is printed will be charged a late entry fee of \$60 per head. A consignor who has entries in the catalog and then later adds additional entries will be assessed the normal \$30 per head entry fee.
- **Junior Show:** Sheep sold through the sale are eligible to be shown by the junior on Sunday, June 11th in Springfield, Illinois as part of THE EVENT.

CATALOG: A sale catalog will be sent out a few weeks prior to the sale and it will be posted on the USSA website.

READ THIS To consign a ram, the consignor must consign a ewe. Maximum of two rams can be consigned by a consignor. A consignor may enter as many ewes as they wish.

SCRAPIE IDENTIFICATION: All entries must carry Scrapie ID. You will need to have Scrapie ID on your Health Papers. The State of Illinois now requires out-of-state consignors to obtain an entry permit no more than 72 hours before entering Illinois. The permit may be obtained by calling the Illinois Dept. of Ag. (217-782-4944). More information on health papers and regulations will be sent to all consignors a few weeks prior to the sale.

MINIMUM BID: There will be a minimum bid of \$400 on all entries.

LAMB CHISLIC

Submitted by Gwen Kitzan, South Dakota
2 pounds American mutton / lamb, cubed
1 tablespoon garlic salt
Oil for frying
Hot sauce to taste

Blue cheese sauce to taste (optional)



The Clever Cleaver

Chislic is a dish consisting of skewered cubes of red meat, usually mutton or lamb, native to South Dakota.

- 1. Be sure to remove any silverskin from the mutton/lamb, and make the cubes about an inch across. Dust with the garlic salt.
- 2. Fill enough oil in a heavy pot or a deep fryer to be able to submerge the mutton/lamb -- you'll be cooking it in batches, so it doesn't need to be huge. Bring it to 350°F. Set out some paper towels to let the finished chislic drain.
- 5. Pat the meat dry with paper towels and carefully drop about 1/2 pound into the fryer. It will roil violently. Let the mutton/lamb fry for about 2 minutes, then move it to the paper towels to drain. Repeat with the remaining mutton/lamb, a 1/2 pound at a time.
- 4. Serve with toothpicks, hot sauce, blue cheese sauce, and fries or Saltines.


