Question & Answer

**Do you have a question for the USSA or Board of Directors?
If so, please email it to news@u-s-s-a.org!**

Question: Our family is new to raising registered Suffolk Sheep. How should we list our membership on our registration papers?

Answer: This question is one with several answers and is frequently asked. The first question that needs to be answered by the family is, if you plan to show your registered Suffolks, where would you show them...County Fairs, Regional Shows, State Fair, NAILE? The complication comes in with this question as all of these may have different ownership requirements—some may be more relaxed and some may be very specific. Any time a member calls the office with this questions, they are encouraged to contact a purebred breeder (may not have to be a Suffolk breeder) who raises and shows registered animals in their state. They usually can advise you on what is best for your future plans and the state that you live in.

How long have you raised Suffolks?

Bill's mother raised Suffolks as a 4H project, so Bill was born into the Suffolk tradition. Because Betsy's brother wanted to have sheep as a 4H project, Betsy was "encouraged" to get a ewe lamb as well. They bought their first Suffolks from Bill's family. Poor Chris and Kyle were given no options. Evan was a convert in January 2012.

What/Who inspired you to raise Suffolks?

See answer above. Evan had a desire to have a stable income.

Discuss the marketing of your Suffolks.

We sell at most of the major sales and off of the farm. We have a site on the internet where we highlight shows and sale sheep, and advertise regularly.

Currently, how many Suffolks do you own?

225 brood ewes: 60 Frame, 125 Production and 40 Wether

What are the benefits of registering your Suffolks?

Registering supports the association, ensures we can command a higher dollar value for our stock and supplies an industry need for registered Suffolks.

What is one of your fondest memories related to Suffolks?

Bill and Betsy met as a result of the sheep. Chris's fondest memory was winning the Supreme Champion Ewe at the 2011 NAILE Junior Show. Kyle's fondest memory is any time he beat Chris in the show ring!

What is something you have gained from raising Suffolks?

A strong family relationship and a family hobby on steroids!!!

What improvements could be made within the USSA to benefit its membership, gain new members and/or retain its current members?

The Association should encourage junior members in any way possible.

Discuss one major challenge facing the USSA or Suffolk breed.

Historically the Suffolk breed dominated the market share in the United States. The steady decline in registrations over the past 15 years reflects that loss of market share. If you look at the Suffolk directory, the median age of the advertisers is 65 or older. This does not bode well for the longevity of the breed. Things need to change to ensure the endurance of our great breed. As an Association and as Breeders, we need to reevaluate how we can regain that dominance. We need to entice youth to our breed as the youth are our future. We need to be willing to modify our current practices to make the breed more user friendly and a viable alternative to some of the other rapidly growing breeds.

UPDATE! USSA FUTURITY REVISIONS & ADDITIONS

EWE LAMB FUTURITY

- ⇒ The ewe lamb futurity will revert back being a competition within USSA Districts.
- ⇒ The first place winner in each district will be guaranteed \$100 payout, with the remaining premiums based on participation within the district.
- ⇒ There will be an overall futurity winner—the individual with the most points across USSA Districts that is guaranteed at least \$500 and will receive a trophy given by Quam Suffolks.

YEARLING EWE FUTURITY ***NEW***

- ⇒ Any purchased yearling ewe is eligible to participate in the USSA Yearling Ewe Futurity.
- ⇒ It is the junior exhibitor's responsibility to nominate the yearling ewe at \$25 per ewe.
- ⇒ Yearling ewes must be nominated by July 1, 2013.
- ⇒ Yearling ewes are to be registered in the INDIVIDUAL NAME ONLY. No partnerships, farm, family, 4-H Club or FFA Chapter names accepted in the futurity program. The junior exhibitor of a futurity yearling ewe may not be a family member or employee of the breeder as listed on the registration paper. For purposes of the USSA Yearling Ewe Futurity, family members shall include children, grandchildren, brothers, sisters, nieces and nephews.
- ⇒ Premiums: The USSA Yearling Ewe Futurity is a national competition, unlike the USSA Ewe Lamb Futurity which is split into districts. There will be a 100% payback for the Yearling Ewe Futurity. Premiums will be paid out by December 31, 2013.

Gyro Burger with Yogurt Sauce

Servings: 4 Preparation Time: 15 Minutes Cook Time: 10 Minutes

Ingredients

1 pound ground American Lamb
1 teaspoon dried oregano, crushed
1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/4 teaspoon onion powder
1/4 teaspoon ground cumin
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 pita bread rounds (6-inch), halved crosswise
1 cup chopped fresh spinach or lettuce

Yogurt Sauce

3/4 cup plain low-fat yogurt
1/2 medium cucumber, peeled and chopped (about 2/3 cup)
2 green onions, thinly sliced
1 tablespoon chopped fresh mint or 1 teaspoon dried mint, crushed
1/4 teaspoon granulated sugar
1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
Salt, optional

Directions

In large bowl, combine oregano, garlic powder, pepper, onion powder, cumin and salt. Add lamb; mix well. Form into 4 patties, about 3/4-inch thick. Grill over medium coals or broil about 5 minutes on each side or to desired degree of doneness.

In medium bowl, combine yogurt, chopped cucumber, sliced green onion, mint and sugar. Split open each pita half forming a pocket. Place gyro-burger in each pocket; top with chopped spinach and yogurt mixture.

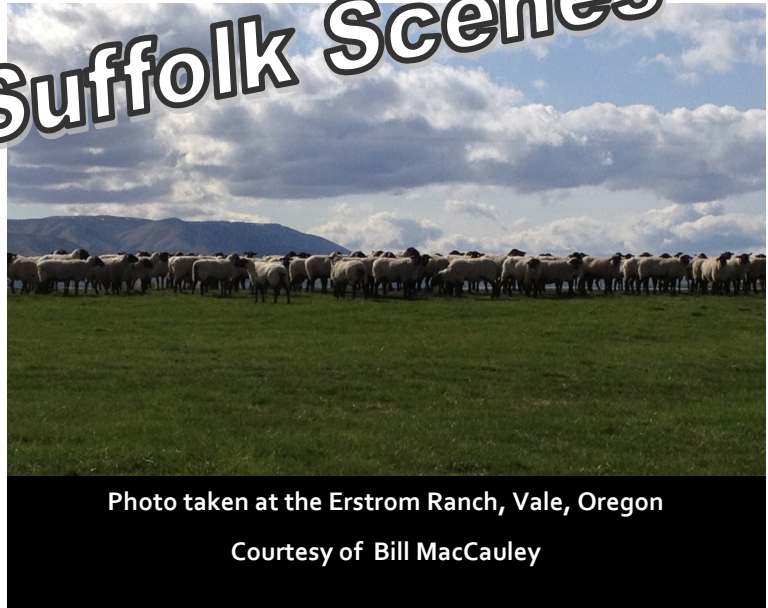
